# Summary Minutes Marketing, Planning, and Legislative Committee Thursday, December 2, 2021, 8:30 a.m.

Due to COVID-19, this meeting was conducted as a teleconference pursuant to the provisions of Assembly Bill 361.

**Call to Order:** Meeting called to order at 8:31 a.m. by Director Worth.

#### 1. Approval of Agenda

The Committee approved the agenda.

#### 2. Public Communication

#### 3. Approval of Minutes from November 4, 2021

The Committee approved the minutes.

#### 4. Mt. Diablo USD Meeting

Mr. Churchill informed the Committee that staff met with several mayors and the new superintendent of the Mt. Diablo School District to discuss traffic congestion around school bell times. Moving forward, staff hopes to meet regularly with the school district's transportation coordinator and look into ways to share data to better serve the schools.

## 5. Pass2Class Update

Ms. Horta presented the results from the Pass2Class program in partnership with 511 Contra Costa. Over 30,000 trips total were taken using the pass during the months of August and October, and more than half of the trips were on 600-series school routes. The top three 600-series routes were Routes 601, 602, and 606 serving WCI, OIS, and Miramonte HS, while Routes 10, 18, 20, 21, and 35 carried the majority of Pass2Class trips on local routes.

# 6. Federal Legislative Update

Mr. Ramacier provided an update on four pieces of federal legislation related to public transit. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) has been enacted and includes a 65% increase in direct spending on public transit. Some of this funding is expected to assist with the transition to zero-emission buses. With the Build Back Better Act, which is almost double the amount of the IIJA, there could be funding available through

competitive grants for some of the types of services that County Connection began operating during COVID, such as trips to access health care, food, and shopping. The Fiscal Recovery Funds Infrastructure Flexibility Act would allow state and local governments to spend some of their ARP funding on transit. The transit budget at the federal level has been enacted and includes \$17 billion for public transit.

## 7. PEPRA & Federal Section 13(c)

Mr. Ramacier informed the Committee that in October, the US Department of Labor informed FTA Region 9 that due to the alleged conflict between PEPRA and Section 13(c), they intend to withhold all California transit operator federal grants, including ARP funds. Staff estimates that if federal funding is withheld for more than two years, TDA reserves will be exhausted, and service will need to be cut.

#### 8. Community Events

Ms. Horta provided a summary of outreach being conducted in December. She noted that the goal for 2022 is to have more consistency in terms of locations and have a set schedule on where staff will be.

SUBJ: 2022 Federal Legislative Program Planning

#### **Background**

Assuming the pandemic is subsiding after a peak of the Omicron wave, the traditional annual visits to Congress and select meetings with US DOT or FTA officials in March of 2022 should be considered. It's also possible that many offices may be willing to meet via Zoom, etc.

Regardless, I recommend that County Connection prepare a 2022 federal legislative advocacy program. So below, I will outline a brief process and suggest likely items to address in the program. Through an agreement with County Connection, I will provide support to the new General Manager for this as he will not have in house ability to produce a program in the near term.

#### **Process**

Staff aims to present to you in February, a draft program and a recommended approach to meeting with the Congressional delegation and/or select federal officials. The formats will be tied to in person meetings and/or Zoom meetings. They will be flexible to meet those two different ways of meeting. Staff (with my support) will reach out to various offices in mid-January to gain a sense of how they anticipate meetings will be handled in March.

If County Connection sends a group to Washington DC in March, you should go in conjunction with the APTA Legislative Conference, set for the week of March 13<sup>th</sup>.

#### Issues

The issues in play that are national in scope are likely to include:

- Possible separate federal highway and transit re-authorization. While the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) has been enacted. It does not in theory replace the need for transportation reauthorization. The IIJA is not funded by the federal highway and mass transit accounts for example. However, it is also possible that the IIJA will become the de facto reauthorization. This will be likely in debate in 2022.
- The Build Back Better Act (BBB) is seemingly still alive, hanging by a thread. This legislation would likely have significant funding opportunities for public transit. Its chances of moving through Congress has to be considered slim, though.
- If reauthorization stalls, a separate bill on bus operator safety may move.
- Other issues may emerge from members of congress.

Relative to County Connection, there are two other areas of federal interest. The first is the reemergence of directed spending or "earmarks". These are likely to be part of the federal budgeting process in 2022. Both Congressmen DeSaulnier and Congressman Swalwell are interested in carrying earmark attempts for County Connection should something clear and obvious be at hand. Projects that help County Connection move towards a zero-emission fleet, create innovative solutions to customer focused projects, or promote equity are likely to gather potential interest. Staff will provide with some examples at your February meeting.

Finally, the issue of PEPRA and the possibility of the Biden administration holding up California transit deferral grants because of it looms. The Court may decide on February 11, 2022, that USDOL cannot use Section 13c of the federal transit laws to hold up California grant solely because PEPRA was enacted by the State in 2013. A decision like that will likely put this issue at rest for a bit. However, should court allow the lawsuit to proceed and lift the current Stay on USDOL from holding grants, then the issue will grow towards a severe challenge for County Connection. It would be appropriate to inform and seek assistance from its Congressional delegation with this issue should USDOL begin withholding grants after February 11, 2022.

#### **Next Steps**

Staff would like to engage the MP&L Committee in a discussion how we should proceed with a 2022 federal legislative program. We would particularly like to receive your feedback and thoughts on approaches to meetings.

If appropriate we would seek your thoughts on moving this item for a full Board discussion.

Finally, we plan to return in February with a draft program and plan of action.

**SUBJECT: I-680 Corridor Projects** 

#### **Background:**

Transportation agencies serving the I-680 corridor between Fairfield and the TriValley have conducted numerous studies aimed at reducing single-occupancy vehicles (SOV) and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Most recently, the Livermore Amador Valley Transit Authority (LAVTA) completed a study that included commuter service between the Martinez Amtrak Station and the Dublin/Pleasanton BART station, with some trips extending to the Pleasanton ACE Station. Those efforts have been incorporated into the Innovate 680 strategies developed by the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA). By partnering with both LAVTA and County Connection, CCTA has developed a project proposal to seek grant funding.

## Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP)

One of those programs is the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP), which provides grants from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to fund transformative capital improvements that will modernize California's intercity, commuter, and urban rail systems, and bus and ferry transit systems, to significantly reduce emissions of greenhouse gases, vehicle miles traveled, and congestion. There have been four prior cycles of TIRCP funding, in which the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) has awarded \$5.8 billion in funding to 73 projects throughout the state. CCTA prepared a draft funding plan that includes various components of the Innovate 680 program such as: shared mobility hubs (SMHs), part-time transit lane (PTTL), express bus, and fare integration.

#### **Commuter Service on I-680**

County Connection has been involved in all the Innovate 680 strategies and most recently part of the TIRCP project development for commuter service along the I-680 corridor. CalSTA staff has been encouraging project submittal for zero emission buses, specifically, hydrogen fuel cell vehicles. The implementation of a one-seat express bus service between the Martinez Amtrak Station and the Dublin/Pleasanton BART Station using hydrogen fuel cell buses and fueling stations was included in the funding plan submitted to MTC by CCTA, seeking MTC endorsement.

# **Financial Implications:**

The associated costs are expected to be covered by the TIRCP grant, matching funds from Measure J and RM3 and the agencies' existing fleet, on an interim basis.
